This week we celebrate Pentecost, the day when Jesus' promise that He would send the Holy Spirit to His followers was fulfilled. In the second chapter of Acts we read of the transformation of the disciples when the Spirit came "like a mighty wind" and "like tongues of fire". It must have been an amazing experience, like a dam bursting or like a wild electrical storm. Such an experience that words could not adequately describe. From then on the Holy Spirit has been given to all Christians to enable, encourage and guide us as we seek to follow Jesus.

Here is a short article by Chris Tabraham on Pentecost and St Columba.:

# Pentecost Sunday 31 May, 2020 And the story of Saint Columba's death.

Christians celebrate the festival of Pentecost fifty days after Easter Sunday; the word comes from the Greek meaning 'fiftieth'. We in the UK know it also as Whit Sunday (Whitsunday), when we recall the Holy Spirit coming in the form of flames to the Apostles, as recorded in Acts 2: 1-4. The *New Testament in Scots* (1983) translates the marvellous event thus:

"Whan the day o Pentecost cam round, they war aa forgethert in ae place, when a o a suddendite a sound like the rair o a blowsterin gell o wind cam oot o the lift an fu'd the haill biggin whaur they war sittin. They saw like tungs o fire, at sindert in twa an sattelt on ilkane o them, an they war aa filled wi the Halie Spirit an begoud speakin in fremmit leids, accordin as the Spirit gae them the pouer tae mouband their thochts."

564 years after the first Day of Pentecost, as early Christians were celebrating the Holy Spirit descending on the Apostles, here in Argyll a holy man of God was ascending into Heaven, for it was at Whitsuntide AD 597 that the blessed Saint Columba passed away on his beloved Iona. His biographer, Abbot Adamnan, ninth abbot of Iona, recorded his passing:

'In the month of May, having found some of his brethren at work on the western side of the island (Iona), he began to speak to them saying: "During the paschal celebrations in the month of April now past, with desire have I desired to depart to Christ the Lord... But lest a joyous festival should be turned for you into mourning, I thought it better to put off for a little while longer the time of my departure from the world." ... After blessing the island and its inhabitants, the saint was carried back to his monastery. ... A few days afterwards, while he was celebrating the solemn office of the Mass as usual on the Lord's Day, he saw an angel of the Lord hovering above within the walls of his oratory; and as the lovely and tranquil aspect of the holy angels infuses joy and exultation into the hearts of the elect, this was the cause of that sudden joy infused into the blessed man. When those who were

present on that occasion inquired as to that joy, the saint looking upwards gave them this reply: "Wonderful and unspeakable is the subtility of the angelic nature! ... This day in the Holy Scriptures is called the Sabbath, which means rest. And this day is indeed a Sabbath for me, for it is the last day of my present laborious life, and on it I rest after the fatigues of my labours; and this night at midnight I shall go to the way of our fathers." After this the saint ascended the hill that overlooketh the monastery, and as he stood there with both hands uplifted, he blessed the monastery saying:

"Small and mean though this place is, yet it shall be held in great and unusual honour, not only by Scottish kings and people, but also by the rulers of foreign and barbarous nations, and by their subjects, the saints also even of other churches shall regard it with no common reverence."

Saint Columba died later that night in the church he had built on Iona, surrounded by his brethren. His prophecy regarding Iona has certainly come true, for Iona is visited by countless pilgrims every year, and his own name is as revered today as it was in his own time.

# Malawi: Kasamba Congregation:

The Mid Argyll Malawi Twinning group decided to send a substantial part of their funds (£3,750) – all donated by the people of Mid Argyll – to Kasamba so that they would have the money available to purchase equipment and food for those around them who are suffering under the restrictions imposed to limit the spread of the virus. The numbers infected are still low but the restrictions are causing a great deal of anxiety and poverty as people are unable to go to work.

We have received this short message on the 24<sup>th</sup> May from Joel, who many will remember, has visited us from Kasamba:

## "Good evening David

Let me take this opportunity on behalf of Kasamba CCAP (Church of Central Africa Presbyterian), to acknowledge receipt of the support you and the entire Mid Argyll Churches have done to us all in order to prevent the spread of Covid 19. Our treasurer accessed the money on Friday at the bank and the congregation was informed yesterday

during Kirk Session meeting. The total amount accessed is Malawi Kwacha MWK 3,390,690.50. A receipt is shown below for information.

The situation here in Malawi is that as of today we have reached 84 cases tested positive with the virus. However, Kasamba congregation still observe the preventative measures specially at our gatherings. I will be advising more on how the money will be utilised. Regards

The Kasamba church continues to meet for worship on Sundays, and spread out over their two halls, with two services. They also provide water for hand washing and sanitising gel. They do not have the infrastructure or the equipment for on-line worship, and few in the congregation will have broadband. Also, I am sure you will realise that the health service in the country is limited and this figure of 84 cases will be seriously under the actual figure for those contracting the disease and many will also be suffering hardship as their income has stopped due to lack of work.

This e-mail from Desiree Mhango, also from Kasamba has also just arrived -

#### Dear All

I would also want to concur with Joel to sincerely thank you for your heartfelt support in amid the COVID 19 pandemic. For the first time Malawi has registered 102 new cases of which 79 were returnees from South Africa and truck drivers. This has doubled the number of infected to 203 since first case diagnosed early April. While it started gradually with strict preventive measures we could have contained the epidemic but now its getting out of hand. Thank you very much for the timely support. A friend in need is a friend indeed. May the good Lord grant you more blessings as per his word. It is blessed to give than to receive. Amen
