Ascension Day

This week in the Christian Calendar we celebrate the "Ascension" of Jesus. After meeting with and teaching the disciples for about six weeks as the Resurrected Jesus, He leaves. This person, the Son of God, as a living breathing man with all the limitations He accepted for that time, goes away.

God intervened in the world by sending His Son as a baby in Bethlehem. The Gospels tell the amazing story of His life and teaching and actions, and now that time is over.

Looking through the Gospels, there is very little written about this "Ascension" event. Christ's birth is described in detail, His crucifixion and resurrection are given lots of narrative, but there is little information on His ascension. Matthew and John don't mention it

All Mark reports is that:

"...after the Lord had spoken to them, He was received up into heaven, and sat down at the right hand of God" Mark Ch 16 v.19

Luke only writes:

"...while He blessed them , He was parted from them and carried up into heaven" Luke ch 24 v 51

The first chapter of Acts (also by Luke) expands this a bit:

"..while they watched, he was taken up and a cloud received Him out of their sight. And while they looked steadfastly toward heaven as he went up, behold, two men stood by them in white apparel. "Men of Galilee, why do you stand here looking into the sky? This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen him go into heaven." Acts Ch 1 v 9 - 11

Altogether a fairly low key event, but so absolutely essential to the message of Jesus. Jesus came as a baby, lived as a man, died as a saviour for all, demonstrated his defeat of death and all the powers of evil, and then left quietly, watched by a few of His followers. How could God leave His human form to recover His place with his Father? How could he fulfil His promises – "where two or three are gathered in my name, there I am in the midst" or "Lo I am with you always, even to the end of the age"?

He couldn't hang around as a man – in one place and one time – He needed to recover His divinity, his place in the God of Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Before He went, He gave His disciples an instruction and a promise. A direction for their lives and the power to carry it out:

Matthew Ch 28 v 18: "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit.. Teaching them to observe all Things I have commanded…"

Mark Ch 16 v 15: "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature.."

Luke Ch 24 v 49: "Behold, I send the promise of my Father upon you, but tarry in the city of Jerusalem until you are endued with power from on high".

Acts Ch 1 v 8 "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you shall be witnesses to Me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and to the end of the earth."

Jesus was getting His earthly body out of the way! His earthly presence was no longer necessary, it was a hindrance, what is needed now to spread the Good News of the Kingdom of God are people empowered by God – filled with the Holy Spirit – lots of people, all of whom He would be with as they lived, preached, taught, and suffered, all across the world. Hundreds, thousands, millions of people who could know His presence, and live with Him, live following Him, and live serving Him.

This low profile, quiet, unobtrusive event of Jesus ascension opened the way for the explosion of the reality of Jesus Christ, Son of God, Jesus Christ, Saviour and redeemer, Jesus Christ – showing the Way, the Truth and the Life, to people, including us, all across the world.

Without His ascension, without His command "to go..." and without the arrival of the promised Holy Spirit for all believers, we would not know the Gospel. We would not have the life, and purpose and hope we have in the truth of the blessing:

"The Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit. Be with us now"

Let us give thanks this Ascension day for all we have received in our faith in Jesus Christ.

The Psalm for Ascension Day is Psalm 47:

This is a psalm of praise and rejoicing – as you read through this – imagine you are in heaven, watching as Jesus ascends from His earthly body to take up His place with God the Father, and all the people in heaven are singing:

O clap your hands all you peoples!
Shout to God with the voice of triumph!
For the Lord most high is awesome;
He is a great King over all the earth,
He will subdue the peoples under us,
And the nations under our feet.
He will choose our inheritance for us.

The excellence of Jacob whom He loves. God has gone up with a shout.
The Lord with the sound of a trumpet Sing praises to God, sing praises!
Sing praises to our King, sing praises!
For God is the King of all the earth;
Sing praises with understanding.

God reigns over the nations;
God sits on his Holy Throne.
The princes and the peoples have gathered together,
The people of the God of Abraham.
For the shields of the earth belong to God
He is greatly exalted.
Amen.
