Hi everyone, I am writing this on Wednesday looking out on to a very wet, drizzly, almost cold July summer day. Why am I surprised? The middle of the school holidays and the village is full of visitors – as it should be at this time, but everyone keeping their distance. This is summer in Argyll.

We would normally (what is normal?) be looking forward to the annual events around the area, Tayvallich Weekend, Ardrishaig Gala, Mid Argyll Show – please add in your own – but this year we are going without – no crowded stalls, no children's races or ceilidh dances. Just getting on with our lives in a low key and steady way. It is not really a hardship, just a bit sad, and the various charities which benefit from the income will this year miss out.

However, we are so aware of how well off we are in this area. In other areas, food banks are busier than ever, in other countries - health services are minimal and Covid 19 can spread rapidly. The appeals from Disasters Emergency Committee, UNHCR, Christian Aid and many others tell us of the plight of millions. I am sure you will have seen many appeals but I think this one from UNHCR gives us an understanding of the problems just one country is facing:

In Yemen, life hangs by a thread for millions.

Earlier this year, the World Health Organisation (WHO) warned that if coronavirus came to Yemen, it would mean a 'perfect storm' of a humanitarian disaster.

That storm has now arrived, with a vengeance.

It's unknown how many Yemenis have died of coronavirus, and how many are infected. The health system is on the brink of collapse, there's little testing and nobody knows the true numbers. But I can tell you what I do know and what I've seen.

Yemenis confirmed with the disease are dying in shocking numbers. Fatality rates from the virus are significantly higher than the global average and new cases continue to climb. And what health facilities remain are having to turn people away because they're full, or because they don't have the equipment or medicines to treat them.

<u>The Yemeni people I live and work alongside are resilient – but how much more can they take?</u> After five years of war 24 million people rely on humanitarian aid for their daily survival, 3.65 million have been forced to flee their homes and 2 million children are at risk of starvation.

As UNHCR's Representative in Yemen it's important I don't let my emotions get the better of me – so I hope you'll forgive my frustration that the global community hasn't done more to reduce people's suffering here. For the last three years we have said that Yemen is the world's worst humanitarian crisis, yet the war still goes on and the people still suffer.

What keeps my team and I going is the knowledge that, with your support, we can save lives. Please give what you can to help displaced Yemeni families survive.

We are fortunate living where we are, but that also gives us the opportunity to look outwards to share what we have been given with others who are in serious difficulties.

This week's Psalm is 105 vs 1 to 11:

Oh, give thanks to the Lord!
Call upon His name;
Make known His deeds among the peoples!
Sing to Him, sing psalms to Him;
Talk of all His wondrous works!

Glory in His holy name;
Let the hearts of those rejoice
Who seek the Lord!
Seek the Lord and his strength;
Seek His face evermore!
Remember His marvellous works
which he has done,
His wonders, and the judgements of His mouth.

O seed of Abraham His servant,
You children of Jacob, His chosen ones!
He is the Lord our God;
His judgements are in all the earth.
He remembers His covenant forever.
The word which He commanded,
For a thousand generations.

The covenant which He made with Abraham, And His oath to Isaac.
And confirmed it to Jacob for a statute,
To Israel as an everlasting covenant.
Saying, "To you I will give the land of Canaan As the allotment of your inheritance."

These verses come in two halves – the opening paragraphs invite us to look outwards, to give thanks and to tell "the peoples" about God, what he has done and is doing, tell others

and rejoice as we seek God and get to know Him more. Seek His strength, remember His works and wonders and all that He has said.

The second half encourages us to look back, at what has gone before in our history, following God. For the Hebrews this always goes back to the calling of Abraham, His trust in God's leading and His faith in God's promises. On these, the bond between God and His people is founded. We too, can look back to Abraham. We, as followers of Jesus, as children of God, are the descendents of Abraham, who God promised would be as numerous as the stars in the sky. (Genesis Ch 15 vs 5) We are some of those stars. Stars who can tell of the glory of God, who can sing psalms to Him of His wonderful works and can seek His strength and His words.

But, sometimes this seems all too much for us, we need to sit, we feel we have done enough. We are weary in our faith, and just want to rest. I found this poem in a book of prayer:

Speak to me Lord, give me your peace. Show me the way to go. I need your love, I need your strength, All of my needs You know.

Be by my side, be in my heart, Be in my every prayer. Filling my life, filling my soul, All of the time be there.....

Give me your love
